BOE Adopted Priority Positions

- Fund Special Education at Statutory Amounts & Expand Definition of At-Risk
- Enhance Student Mental Health
- Eliminate Tax Credits and Vouchers for Private Schools

- Bipartison Effort
- Passed the Senate 35-4
- Passed the House 107-9
- Sent to the Governor

- o Governor's recommended (constitutional) funding in 2021, 2022, 2023
- SB 32 Dual enrollment
- <u>HB 2068</u>, Tax Credit Scholarship, includes free & reduced lunch eligible, grades K-8
- SB 93/HB 2067 Budget certification providing districts have needed funding to educate students
- o SB 173 High-density at-risk; adds "dyslexia and dyslexia characteristics"
- SB 51 Foster care education report card
- o <u>SB 63</u> ACT, Work keys assessments for accredited private and home schools

- Remote learning language:
 - Allow remote learning for 40 hours, as determined by local board
 - In a state of disaster, districts may apply to KSDE for a waiver allowing up to 240 hours remote
 - If remote learning goes beyond 240 hours, the student will be funded at the virtual student rate of \$5,000
- KSDE discretionary ESSER funding to be used as follows:
 - \$5M school safety grants
 - \$3.9M Mental health pilot
 - \$100,000 Communities in Schools
 - \$80,000 Grant to Center for Reading Development and Support at Pittsburg State, to develop higher ed training curricula
 - Recommending additional school employee compensation of up to \$500, not limited to teachers, for those working in the 20-21 and 21-22 school years (not mandatory)

- Statewide School Finance tax levy
 - Re-authorize the 20-mill property tax levy for 2021-22 & 2022-23
- Other tax items not necessarily related to schools
- Passed the Senate 35-0
- Passed the House 108-3
- Sent to Governor

Civics Test, Financial Literacy

- Requires students beginning in the 2022-2023 school year to pass a civics test comprised of 60 questions from the naturalization test as a condition of graduation
- Requires students beginning in the 2024-2025 school year to pass a financial literacy course as a condition of graduation
- Passed the Senate 25-13 and the House 72-51; Sent to the governor
- Governor Vetoed
- Senate overrode the veto
- House did not act so the veto was sustained

Conceal Carry

● HB 2058

- Lower the conceal carry license age to 18
- Reciprocity with out of state conceal carry licenses
- Passed House 80-43
- Passed Senate 30-8
- Governor Vetoed
- Senate Override veto 31-8 and House Override veto 84-39
- Veto was not sustained and HB 2058 will become law

Guns are not allowed in K-12 buildings per Kansas state statute.
