Test(s)	Description
<p style="text-align: center;">ELA & Math State Assessments</p>	<p>The Kansas State Assessments fall under the umbrella of the Kansas Assessment Program or KAP. All sophomores participate in the ELA and math state assessments, which measure student mastery of state standards.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Science & Social Studies State Assessments</p>	<p>The Kansas State Assessments fall under the umbrella of the Kansas Assessment Program or KAP. All juniors participate in the science state assessment, which measures a student's mastery of state science standards. All juniors also participate in the social studies state assessment, though this is embedded in the U.S. History curriculum and looks/feels more like a project.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">FASTtrack Reading</p>	<p>All students are given the FASTtrack Reading assessment during the fall of their freshmen year. The information collected indicates whether a student is on track to meet future reading goals. Since this is our reading screener, if students score below a certain benchmark, they will be asked to participate in further testing.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Pre-ACT (Preliminary ACT)</p>	<p>All freshmen and some sophomores take the Pre-ACT, a test aligned with and designed to predict future performance on the ACT. Like the ACT, students are tested in English, Math, Reading, and Science.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">ACT</p>	<p>Per the Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE), all Kansas juniors are given one free opportunity to participate in an ACT exam. The ACT tests students in English, Math, Reading, and Science. There are also ACT (and SAT) opportunities on Saturdays; Saturday participation is not free, and level of participation is up to the student/family.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">ACT WorkKeys</p>	<p>(OPTIONAL) Per KSDE, all Kansas juniors/seniors are given one free opportunity to participate in an ACT WorkKeys exam. The test measures workplace readiness and is accepted by many employers throughout the United States as evidence of a student's ability to perform a particular job. The test has three sections – applied math, graphic literacy, workplace documents.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">NMSQT PSAT (National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test – Preliminary SAT)</p>	<p>(OPTIONAL) Sophomores and juniors may choose to take this test. While this is a practice test for sophomores, juniors who score well can qualify for National Merit Scholarship awards.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">AP Exams (Advanced Placement)</p>	<p>(OPTIONAL) These are subject specific exams, usually taken by students who are completing a particular AP course. Passing scores can earn college credit.</p>
