I appreciate the safe space created at OTE that has set the foundation for being culturally inclusive and providing students a safe space to express what is on their hearts and minds openly. As every family navigates this tragedy differently, our staff will continue to promote compassion and acceptance in crisis.

Our staff lifts every voice and empowers staff and students to speak openly. As we may not explicitly teach the details of what is occurring, we aim to set the stage for talking to students about conflict and informing them of the individuals who are here to listen and provide support as feelings and concerns arise. Some students have invited this dialogue, while others find comfort in silence. Our staff will continue to find a way to open the door of opportunities for staff and students to express themselves and seek the support in place (i.e., counselor, social worker, administration, classroom teachers, etc.).

Parent-Student-Teacher Compact | Title I

Parent-Student-Teacher Compact



The school-parent compact is a written agreement between teachers and parents. It is a document that clarifies what families and schools can do to help children reach high academic standards. The compact is a written commitment and serves as a clear reminder of everybody's responsibility to act at school and home so that children can learn what is required. This agreement aims to help parents and teachers reach a consensus on the responsibilities of the individuals influencing student achievement. If the compact is taken seriously and implemented effectively, it will ensure that there will be support for the academic success of the student by enhancing effective communication between school and home.

As a Parent – I promise to:

- · Let the teacher know if my child has any problems with learning
- Use reading materials the school sends home each week to help my child
- Read to my child 20 minutes a day
- Keep a list of new words, and link letter to sounds
- Help my child see how to use reading to pursue his/her interests and goals

As a Student - I promise to:

- · Let my teacher and family know if I need help
- · Read on my own and with my family every day
- · Work on reading skills at home, using the materials my teacher sends home
- Write down assignments, do my homework every day, and turn it in when it's due

As the Teacher – I promise to:

- · Create a partnership with every family in my class
- · Monitor student progress in reading and update parents
- Make sure all students get help as soon as it's needed
- · Send home learning materials in reading
- Explain my approach to teaching, expectations, and grading system to students and their families
- · Continually work on my teaching strategies so that I can successfully teach all children
- · Assign work that is relevant and interesting

Halloween Celebration | October 31

On Tuesday, October 31, we will have our school-wide Halloween celebration. We are excited to welcome our families to the school parade, but due to space constraints, we will only have room parents and three volunteers per class to enter the building to facilitate class parties. Please look forward to communication from your room parents soon providing more details about volunteering for this year's class celebrations.

We request that room parents implement **one game or craft** to accompany the food for each classroom celebration.

Food

Provided food will need to come from our district-approved <u>Nut-Safer Guide</u>. Please refrain from bringing homemade items for class celebrations.

Costumes

All students look forward to the Halloween Celebration; we have specific guidelines for these parties.

1. At classroom parties where costumes may be worn, violent or gory costumes are unacceptable.



- 2. Costumes should not take away from instructional time. If a costume distracts self and others, the student will be asked to go to the nurse to change.
- 3. No costume "weapons" or look-alike weapons may be brought to school, e.g., light sabers, swords, or toy guns.
- 4. Costumes will be worn to school and should not depict violence or gore.
- 5. Students should have costumes that do not require time-consuming assistance with makeup, dressing, etc. Also, masks and face paint should not be worn or brought to school.
- 6. Costumes must respect the Blue Valley dress code policy BOE policy 3513.

Halloween Parade and Celebration

1:45 PM: Room Parents Enter and Parade Prep

 Room parents and three volunteers for each class will be invited to begin setting up for the class party and supporting costume adjustments. Please look forward to communication from room parents, who will facilitate communication with families to gather volunteers for this year's celebrations.

2:15 PM: Parade

We will have a school-wide parade that includes the fifth grade leading all grade levels out the
bus-cut doors, walking on the west side of the Early Childhood playground, and circling the track
counterclockwise before entering the exterior gym doors. Families are invited to watch the parade
from the field.

2:30 PM: Monster Mash

 Teachers will guide students into the gym for the Monster Mash, a short sing and dance-along led by specialists. When the Monster Mash concludes, students return to class for the class celebration. Parents and caregivers will not enter the building for the Monster Mash.

2:55 PM-3:25 PM: Class Celebration

• The class celebration will consist of one game **or** craft and treats. Only room parents and their volunteers can attend the class celebration. Room parents and volunteers will submit dismissal changes through PUP if they apply. In addition, you will need to sign out on the provided sign-out sheet in the room you are supporting.

Nut-Safer Guidelines


At OTE, we have a wide variety of food allergens and restrictions. To remain safe and to prevent exclusion, we don't accept food, including items from the Nut-Safe List, to serve in school or send home with students for birthday celebrations. This complies with our **non-edible birthday celebration**. Essentially, we must remember that sending food home is a risk for children as they transition between school and home, putting our families in an undesirable position when they cannot eat what is provided.

Blue Valley (BV) School's Nut Safer Guidelines for daily snacks will be implemented throughout the school year.

- · Classroom snacks must be from the Nut Safer list.
- · Nut Safer seating is available in the café during lunch.

We appreciate your support as we work to be more preventative with food safety measures to enhance student and staff safety.
