Student Services January Snapshot

Each month we will be using a section of the Sources of Strength wheel as the basis for our flex lessons. This month focused on healthy activities that help cope with stress.

All grades: In flex classes, students reflected on how stress affects each of us individually. We discussed the positive and negative effects of stress and ways that we can cope with it.

Covid Protocols for Athletics

Until further notice, athletes in a KSHSAA sport (basketball, cheer and track and field) must follow the guidelines listed below.

- If a student tests positive for Covid, they will be eligible to return to school on day 6 if they are symptom free for 24 hours free from any medication. Students will need to wear a mask throughout the day as well as during practice and games, no exceptions through day 10. Students will eat in a separate setting until day 10.
- Students who test positive for Covid, will need a doctor's note clearing them for return to
 play procedures for their school sport (this season: boys basketball and cheer), which will
 be completed by our athletic trainer when they get the doctor's clearance and return to
 school and practice. This is the guidance from KSHSAA and is being followed by all
 member schools at all levels in the state.
- Masking during physical activity is not necessary outside of the 10 day window, but a
 doctors clearance for return to play is once a student tests positive.

6th Grade News

Math:

6th grade math will be staring the Statistics Unit next week. There will be an independent project driven by each students' individual interests and curiosities on a subject of their choice.

ELA:

After research and pre-writing last week, students started writing their Cell Phone argumentative essay this week. They learned how to write a 3-prong thesis statement, topic sentences, and supporting their claim with evidence from informational texts. Students also worked on grammar, organization, and effective writing skills as they continued to draft throughout the week.

Science:

Our topic this week is Continental Drift Theory and Sea Floor Spreading. We are finishing up Convection Currents. Ask your child about it.

Social Studies:

This week students filmed travel commercials about Athens or Sparta. Ask your child where they decided they wanted to live and why. Next week we will be learning about some of the conflicts and wars that ancient Greeks faced.

7th Grade News

ELA:

Students are concluding their Argumentative Writing Unit. Should schools start later? Is access to the Internet a human right? Ask your student what topic what they picked and argued for or against! We are seeing some great writers in the making! Next up: We will read the classic novel, *Where the Red Fern Grows*. Dig out the tissues for this heartwarming story! Math:

We are exploring integrating proportional relationships to real world problems and situations. Using scale factor and proportions to make predictions.

Science:

What do you get when you cross genetics with probability and chance in math? Real life! Err... **Punnett Squares**! We investigated the probability of offspring inheriting certain **traits** based on the **genotypes** of the parents. We also practiced identifying **phenotypes** based on known genotypes as a way to apply and practice our vocabulary. Your student(s) learned how to do these probability charts (Punnett Squares) with fun characters from SpongeBob and student designed aliens. It has been a lot of fun playing matchmaker!

Social Studies:

We've been learning about the earliest inhabitants of Kansas- the paleoindian peoples who arrived to this area about 10,000 years ago, and their descendants, the more modern American Indian tribes! It's really hard to imagine what Kansas looked like over these millenia, because based on archaeological evidence, the geography has gone through some very different looks compared to today! We're finishing up this early period of history with a fun, short project to design a roadtrip across the state, and next we'll be looking at European and American settlement of the area as the cultures begin to meet.

8th Grade News

Algebra:

Systems of equations and start systems of inequalities.

Math 8:

Testing over parallel lines being intersected by a transversal. Begin work on interior and exterior angles of triangles.

Moss Science:

Continue investigation of Newton's laws. Examine the effects of mass on changes in motion.

Farris Science:

Farris Science: Starting the egg drop lab. Students need to bring supplies from home that will prevent an egg from breaking when dropped from the 3rd floor. Items are due on Monday, January 31.

From the Desk of Mrs. Tate

I love the change of seasons in Kansas. I love how the weather lets me know that we're moving through the seasons and life cycles of our earth. I love the smell of a fall morning. I love the smell of fresh cut grass in summer. I love the baby plants peeking through the soil in spring. I love a fresh blanket of snow. And...the older I get, the faster I want winter to be over. It's cute in the beginning, but I'm tired of being cold.

This time of year is sometimes hard for our kids. The cold weather prevents them from being outside as much as they may like. The days are short, and it's no fun to come to school in the dark and watch it get dark so early in the evening. This phenomenon can impact students (and adults) motivation, and we often see kids' grade slip during this time.

As we make our way through winter, I thought it might be helpful to provide some tools to keep kids motivated to stay current with their schoolwork, so their grades don't suffer.

- **Keep moving!** Even though it's cold outside, make sure to stay active. Regular exercise, even indoors, helps reduce stress and improve sleep.
- Spend some time outside! Even though it's cold, the fresh air and change of scenery can change your perspective and clear your head.
- Eat well! When the winter blahs threaten to make you reach for chips and dip...again...grab some fresh fruit, make a salad, or munch on crunchy vegetables. Comfort foods leave you sluggish, but healthy foods give you energy.
- Set mini-goals! If procrastination is creeping in, set 5-10 minute productivity goals. Reach them and set another one. Do this a few times in a row, then give yourself a reward (like a healthy snack, a quick dance party, or 5 minutes in the sunshine). You could set a goal for 13 seconds; Patrick Mahomes and his team accomplished A LOT in 13 seconds!

Winter doesn't have to be dreary! After all, spring is right around the corner, and we'll be outside again for another 9 months.
