

The American School Counselor Association (ASCA) has set aside February 3-7 this year as National School Counseling Week. The idea is to create awareness of the services that school counselors provide to our school. It is also a time for school counselors to advocate for their program. We appreciate the support the entire staff and community provides the counseling program and student services in general.

We would like to take the opportunity this week to share some information about the school counselor profession and our first semester data!

School counselors focus on the academic, career, and social/emotional development of all students K-12. Today school counselors hold a master's degree with most programs requiring 45-60 hours. Included in this is about 900 contact hours through practicum and internship. With a master's in school counseling, most counselors can take just a few additional hours before they are eligible to test for their LPC which allows them to work in private practice counseling. In 2002, the American School Counseling Association cemented this new role of school counselors when they released the ASCA National Model for school counseling.

As school counselors we support the needs of our school through delivery of lessons, small groups, individual student support, and collaboration with teachers, parents, and staff. In order to best support our school we assess our needs through data collection. We would like to share some of that data with you:

From September-December

- We spent 60 hours in classrooms. We've been in 155 classrooms to deliver our counseling lessons.
- We have spent 175 hours with individual students. That's 25 whole school days in direct contact with students (out of 68 days we were in school)!
- We spent 65 hours in meetings with teachers and administrators to collaborate in order to meet student needs.

We believe that we are better as a team. We want to partner with you to best support your student.

6th Grade News

Math:

Math is continuing to work in our Statistics Project.

Science:

Our topic this week is Plate Tectonics. Students will learn each boundary and what is created there. History of Earth Digital Notebooks for Gooden and Lockard are due Tuesday, 2/15.

Social Studies:

This week we learned about Alexander the Great's conquest of the ancient world. Students participated in a Socratic Seminar about his conquest. Next week we will finish up our Greek projects on Monday. All students should be ready to present their projects on Tuesday and Wednesday.

ELA:

Students began the Self-Directed Argumentative Essay on a topic of their choice from the Library Libguide provided. Ask your student what topic they selected and why? Final essays will be due next Wednesday, Feb. 16th.

7th Grade News

ELA:

Students have started reading the heartwarming classic, *Where the Red Fern Grows*, by Wilson Rawls. We are studying writing techniques such as: figurative language, point of view, and characterization. Ask your student to tell you one fact about Wilson Rawls that was surprising to them.

Math:

- Molde: Students learned that superhero Scale Ella's scaling abilities are "outta sight". We
 rotated through a variety of stations playing Jenga, small grouping with the teacher,
 digitally practicing scaling similar figures, and practicing real-world scenarios where
 proportions can be used in life. Next week we will focus on all things proportions through
 one giant pizza problem! Stay tuned!
- Tiffany & Cook: Students connected proportional relationships to our previous precent

commission, and tax!

Science:

- Bergerhofer: Students extracted DNA from strawberries this week and reviewed the concepts covered so far in genetics!
- Fairburn & Molde: Students worked through a variety of fun tasks in order to best prepare for our genetics assessment and make connections between the content to the real world. Ask them about our "egg-cellent" station rotations!

Social Studies:

What *DO* you do when you find a 9,000 year old Paleoamerican skeleton? That question was the subject of debate in Social Studies classes this week as we learned and debated about who has the rights to the bones of Kennewick Man. Students engaged in a role play writing activity where they had to take on one of four possible stakeholder roles in this debate, and creatively write about a choice of four topics relating to the situation. They could write, draw, or even act out their role and interpretation! It's been so entertaining to see them engaged in arguing their little hearts out while pretending to be someone else.

We also spent this week learning about the first explorers to Kansas from Spain, France, and, eventually, the United States. What were these explorers looking for, and what did they find when they got here? Ask your student(s)!

8th Grade News

Algebra 1:

Finishing up systems of equations unit. Looking into car purchases and how systems can be used to find the best deal

Math 8:

Interior and exterior angles of triangles.

Social Studies:

Specific battles of the Civil War. Including Bull Run, Antietam and Gettyburg. Students will continue their Histagram (Historical Instagram) project. They are posting from the perspective of selected historical figures about how they would respond to various Civil War events.

Science:

Finishing up Motion Unit to prepare for the Rube Goldberg and paper rollercoaster project.

ELA:

Continue Holocaust museum research project.
