
TEACHER APPRECIATION

6th Grade News

Science:

We will be beginning our Rocks and Minerals Unit. Students will get their new digital notebook. This week we'll focus on what are minerals and how they are formed.

Social Studies:

We have wrapped up our unit on Ancient Greece and moved next door to Ancient Rome.

Students will now be learning about the conquests and military strategies of the Roman

Empire. We are just getting started, so ask your student next week how their team is setting themselves up to amass provinces and conquer enemies.

ELA:

We started the Propaganda Unit this week. Students analyzed print and television advertisements to evaluate the propaganda techniques used to sell products or services. Now it's their turn to get some creative juices flowing and create a print advertisement for a product they come up with. Ask your child what produce or service they have designed this week.

Math:

Classes are finishing the Statistics Project next week. Our next unit will be expressions and equations.

7th Grade News

ELA:

Students are applying their knowledge of figurative language within the writing of *Where the Red Fern Grows*. They are starting to think deeper about why the author uses specific descriptions and what figurative language does for writings.

Math:

We will continue our exploration of proportional relationships by calculating unit rates, comparing them, and determining the better buy.

Science:

Students further explored genetics concepts by looking at mutations this week. It's mind-blowing to discover that such a tiny thing, our DNA, can have such a large scale impact if an unexpected change takes place. Students modeled DNA chains and mutations within them, then explored these large scale effects by researching genetics topics of their choice. They also had two options with which to share their findings with their teacher. Some students chose to research a genetic disorder, while others chose to research genetics topics that interest them, such as the Human Genome Project, hereditary probability, or selective breeding. Take the humble Brussels sprout for example. We can feel the cringe and eye roll from some of you already, because perhaps you grew up with unpalatable boiled, bitter Brussels sprouts? But starting about 20ish years ago, scientists in the Netherlands started selectively breeding them to be less bitter, and in the last 10 years or so, Brussels sprouts have boomed in popularity here in the states. The science teachers LOVE them, and it's all because of some science and selective breeding! Read more here! Or click here for Mrs.

Ultimately, through this research task, we love seeing what interests the kids, because this is all their choice in what they want to learn more about!

Social Studies:

What would encourage people to pack up their belongings and travel 2000 miles west on foot, across mountains and/or desert to begin life anew? What would push people away, and what would draw people to make that choice? Students learned about westward migration and the

resettlement of the area after the Homestead Act, as well as what these travelers experienced while journeying the trails west. We also learned about frontier life and cowboys, and students tied it all together with a silly assessment of their learning to design their own ranch brand and write about their "travels" across the frontier.

This week students have been generating research ideas and composing inquiry based research questions regarding the Holocaust and/or events associated with World War II. Although we never want to frustrate anyone, it's important that you know the **why** behind our routines and procedures. Our parents and guardians have been amazingly supportive of our efforts. Making sure that the people who enter our building have valid business here goes a long way in keeping our kids, staff and community safe.
